

PURPOSE AND CONTENTS OF THIS MAP

The designations shown on this motor vehicle use map (MVUM) were made by the responsible official pursuant to 36 CFR 212.51; are effective as of the date on the front cover of this MVUM: and will remain in effect until superceded by next year's MVUM.

Forest Supervisor, Sawtooth National Forest

It is the responsibility of the user to acquire the current MVUM. This MVUM shows the National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and the areas on National Forest System lands in the Minidoka Ranger District that are designated for motor vehicle use pursuant to 36 CFR 212.51. This MVUM also identifies the vehicle classes allowed on each route and in each area; and any seasonal restrictions that apply on those routes and in Designation of a road, trail, or area for motor vehicle use

by a particular class of vehicle under 36 CFR 212.51 should not be interpreted as encouraging or inviting use or implying that the road, trail, or area is passable, actively maintained, or safe for travel. Motor vehicle designations include parking along designated routes and at facilities associated with designated routes when it is safe to do so and when not causing damage to National Forest System resources. Seasonal weather conditions and natural events may render designated roads and trails impassable for extended periods. Designated areas may contain dangerous or impassable terrain. Many designated roads and trails may be passable only by high-clearance vehicles or four-wheel-drive vehicles. Maintenance of designated roads and trails will depend on available resources, and

many may receive little maintenance. This motor vehicle use map identifies those roads, trails, and areas designated for the motor vehicle use under 36 CFR 212.51 for the purpose of enforcing the prohibition at 36 CFR 261.13. This is a limited purpose. The other public roads are shown for information and navigation purposes only and are not subject to designation under the Forest Service travel management regulation. These designations apply only to National Forest System roads, National Forest System trails, and areas

PROHIBITIONS

It is prohibited to possess or operate a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands on the Ketchum designations (CFR 261.13)

on National Forest System lands.

Violators of 36 CFR 261.13 are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, imprisonment for up to 6 months, or both (18 U.S.C. 3571(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs.

This map does not display nonmotorized uses, oversnow uses, or other facilities and attractions on the Ketchum Ranger District. Obtain forest visitor information from the local national forest office.

to temporary, emergency closures. As a visitor, you must comply with signs notifying you of such restrictions. A national forest may issue an order to close a road, trail or area on a temporary basis to protect the life, health, or safety of forest visitors or the natural or cultural resources in these areas. Such a temporary and/or emergency closures are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212.52 (b), 36 CFR 261 subpart B).

The designation "road or trail open to all motor vehicles" does not supersede State traffic law.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Operating a motor vehicle on National Forest System subject to State traffic law, including State requirements for licensing, registration, and operation of the vehicle in

In 1996, the Sawtooth NF instituted a Special Order for portions of the Forest that prohibited the landing of private aircraft outside of designated airfields (36 CFR 261.58(y)). This prohibition was issued to protect critical habitat, minimize harassment to wildlife and ensure user safety. Support for this closure was included in a 2012 amendment to the Sawtooth National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan and the Forest Supervisor reissued a Special Order on May 21, 2013 that reaffirmed the appropriateness and need for the closure to: - Protect critical winter habitat or minimize harassment of wildlife, specifically, wolverine, mountain goats and elk, - Address safety concerns including avalanche issues and the effects on other users that may be in the area including

This symbol, used in conjunction with one of the other road or trail symbols, indicates that the road or trail is open only during certain portions of the year. Refer to Seasonal Designation Table for further instructions.

This symbol is used along with a designated road or trail to indicate limited cross-country motor vehicle use within a specific distance of that route, solely for the purpose of dispersed camping. The dots indicate where

BLANKET STATEMENTS FOR

Where designated on the Motor Vehicle Use Map, motor vehicle use off of designated roads and trails for the purpose of dispersed camping is permitted for up to 300 feet from the centerline of the road and 100 feet from the centerline of the trail when it is safe to do so and when not causing damage to National Forest System
