Bankhead National Forest – Big Tree Wildfire, Sipsey Wilderness

Incident: Big Tree Wildfire

Released: 10/23/2015-Time: 10:30 a.m.

A 1518-acre wildfire continues to burn in the Sipsey Wilderness of the Bankhead National Forest as of Oct. 23. U.S. Forest Service fire personnel are taking immediate action to contain the fire that has temporarily closed 8 trails leading into the Sipsey Wilderness. Today's strategy is to continue making progress to contain the fire within established control lines. We will also continue limited burn out operations to strengthen control lines. The public living near the Sipsey Wilderness may see an increase in smoke and Forest Service personnel. Hikers planning to use 4 open trails in the Sipsey Wilderness and hunters in the Black Warrior Management Area are asked to check the Forest Service website, bulletin boards, Facebook and Twitter for a listing of open trails and status updates. The safety of the public and wildland firefighters is our number one priority.

Quick Facts

- Wildland fire type: Wildland Fire (Wilderness)
- Cause: Law Enforcement Officers are currently investigating
- Reported: Oct. 16 to Bankhead District Dispatch by hikers at 4:14 p.m.
- Location: Northwest Alabama Sipsey Wilderness and the Black Warrior Management Area (Lawrence County) in the Bankhead National Forest.
- Acres involved now: 1518 acres as of Oct. 23
- Containment: 15%
- Equipment: Hand crews, leaf blowers and a Type 3 helicopter. No heavy equipment used.
- Personnel: 40 single resources from various states –Alabama, North Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Tennessee. One Hotshot Crew (15 person) from Virginia and an Initial Attack Crew (20 person) from Asheville, NC.
- Strategy: Hand crews, leaf blowers and burn out are used to have less impact and maintain wilderness characteristics.
