## **Recreation RAC Charter Summary**

Overview. The National Recreation Resource Advisory Council Charter outlines the Recreation RAC's mission and specific duties. In many ways, it reflects the language found in the Recreation Enhancement Act (REA).

## Officers and Membership:

- Establishes five Recreation RACs.
- Recognizes that Recreation RACs may not be established if, in consultation with State Governors, insufficient exists to continue the Recreation RACs.
- Identifies membership as reflected in the REA.
- Requires that State Governors and county officials be given the opportunity to submit nominees for membership vacancies.
- States that members shall be appointed to 2 or 3-year terms for the first (subsequent terms shall be 3 years).
- States that alternates will not serve in a member's absence. They will fill member vacancies.
- States members can be removed if they miss more than two consecutive meetings.
- States that recommendations require a majority vote from each of the three member categories as well as documentation of general public support.
- States that a Chairperson will be selected by the Committee (through a majority vote.)
- Identifies the DFO and the BLM counterpart (if appropriate) and states that recommendations will be given to these officials.
- Expires September 28, 2008, though can be renewed through the duration of the Recreation Enhancement Act (December 2014).

## Member Duties:

- States duties are to serve in an advisory capacity regarding changes to or the implementation or elimination of recreation fees and the recreation fee program.
- States that Recreation RACs do not make recommendations regarding concessionaire fees or commercial permits.
- States that Recreation RACs may create and operate subcommittees on approval by the DFO.





## Meetings and Record Keeping:

- Recreation RACs will meet at least once annually.
- Meetings can be in person, by phone or electronically.
- Meetings must be announced at least one week in advance in local newspapers and 15 days in advance in the *Federal Register*.
- Meetings require 8 members in attendance to achieve a quorum.
- The DFO will ensure meeting minutes are kept and made available to the public.
