

DIGGING INTO TRAIL WORK

LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS GET THEIR HANDS DIRTY



In 2022, several youth groups and schools volunteered their time to help the Santa Fe National Forest build and maintain trails. Santa Fe Prepatory Academy was one of these groups that assisted with trail building at the new Arroyo Hondo trail system. Under the supervision of Santa Fe Fat Tire Society, the high school students cleared trees and brush. cut in new trail and tread drainage features. rehabilitated user-made trails causing erosion issues. Participant Nico Roth, who also coordinated the work days, weighed in on the trail building experience:

"As a mountain biker, I love helping to build new local trails because I know I'll get to ride them at some point. But beyond my own inclinations, I value the legacy of volunteerism Santa Fe Prep has instilled in its students, along with a service-oriented mindset. Santa Fe's recreationists are one of a kind because we are active participants in our community, and being a part of that is special."
