
WORKING AND LEARNING THROUGH WATERSHED RESTORATION

This summer, youth from River Source's Watershed Academy worked with the Santa Fe National Forest on a variety of projects. The organization recruited and hired 35 individuals between the ages of 15 and 25 years old in communities around Northern New Mexico (El Rito, Pecos, Peñasco, Las Vegas/Mora, and Santa Fe), all of whom were locals. Crews worked on a variety of projects from monitoring and data collection to mapping and analysis. Much of the work completed in the Santa Fe National Forest ocurred in the Hermits Peak/Calf Canyon burn scar and aimed to improve watershed-scale conditions in impacted areas. Each Watershed Academy crew term culminated in a community presentation to share details of work accomplished and provide participants practice in public speaking and engaging with the communities they served.


TRAIL ADOPTERS






PACKING INTO THE PECOS






HAVE YOU SUBMITTED YOUR HOURS AND WORK REPORTS YET?
