There should be a maximum effort without delay to designate wilderness and wild and scenic rivers in the northern Black Hills and Bear Lodge Mountains which are relatively unprotected compared to the southern Black Hills.	Thank you for expressing your concern. In total, 5 segments (Little Elk Creek, Little Spearfish Creek, Spearfish Creek, Sand Creek, and Beaver Creek) within the Northern Hills and Bear Lodge Districts were found to meet eligibility criteria for National Wild and Scenic Rivers.
We look forward to designation of all 16 rivers discussed in this assessment.	To update information, prior eligibility assessment found that 16 rivers were eligible. The current 2022 assessment found 21 streams or stream segments totaling 144.7 miles eligible for inclusion in the NWSRS.
The Forest Service identifies an "Eligible river for inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System in the Bear Lodge District." We are unclear which segment this list is directed toward as and it is recommended that either a map or GPS coordinates are included to define the appropriate segment.	Appendix A; Stream Evaluations Reports includes locations, area maps, segment lengths, corridor acres, segment breakdowns, descriptions of outstandingly remarkable values, and rationales for classification. Maps identifying river and stream segments have also been posted online in association to the assessment document.
The assessment should list the river and stream segments that are eligible by scenic, wild and recreation river groups. This is a major omission that makes it impossible for the public and stakeholders to properly comment on this topic. A map of these streams and rivers would be helpful.	
The Forest Service should outline in more detail the process that has been done to date regarding potential Wild and Scenic River Designations specifically the eligibility and suitability evaluation information as required by the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968 and more specifically the Forest Service Handbook 1909.12, Chapter 81 that describes the threestep process, consisting of a) determining eligibility, b) assigning potential classification (wild, scenic, recreational) and c) determining suitability.
