

FIRE REQUIREMENTS



It is the permittee's responsibility to comply with Fire Prevention Precautions; these may restrict access to areas in the National Forest or chainsaw use.

Chainsaws and other internal combustion engines must have an approved spark arrestor.

Have a shovel of at least 46" in length and an approved fire extinguisher in the immediate area of chainsaw use.

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Six Rivers National Forest Personal Use Fuelwood Map

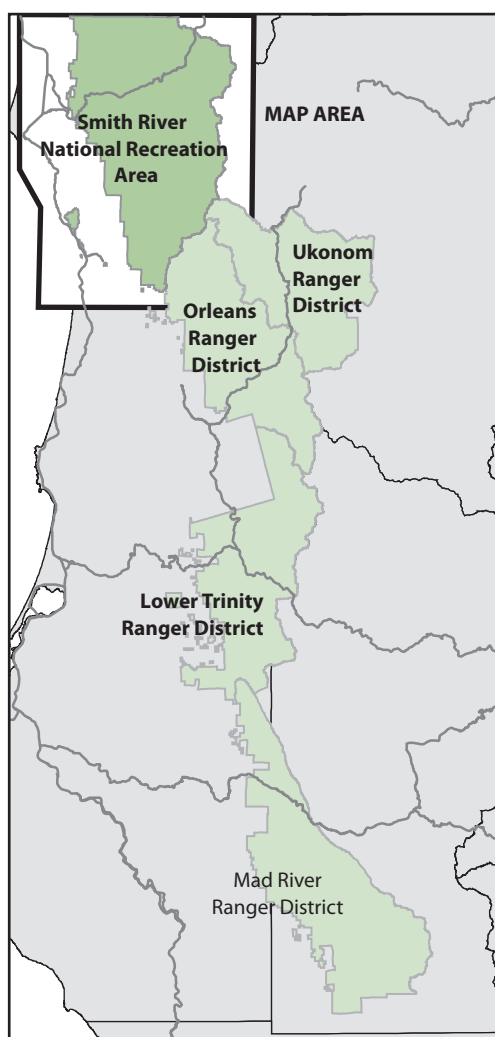

When cutting, gathering, or transporting fuelwood:

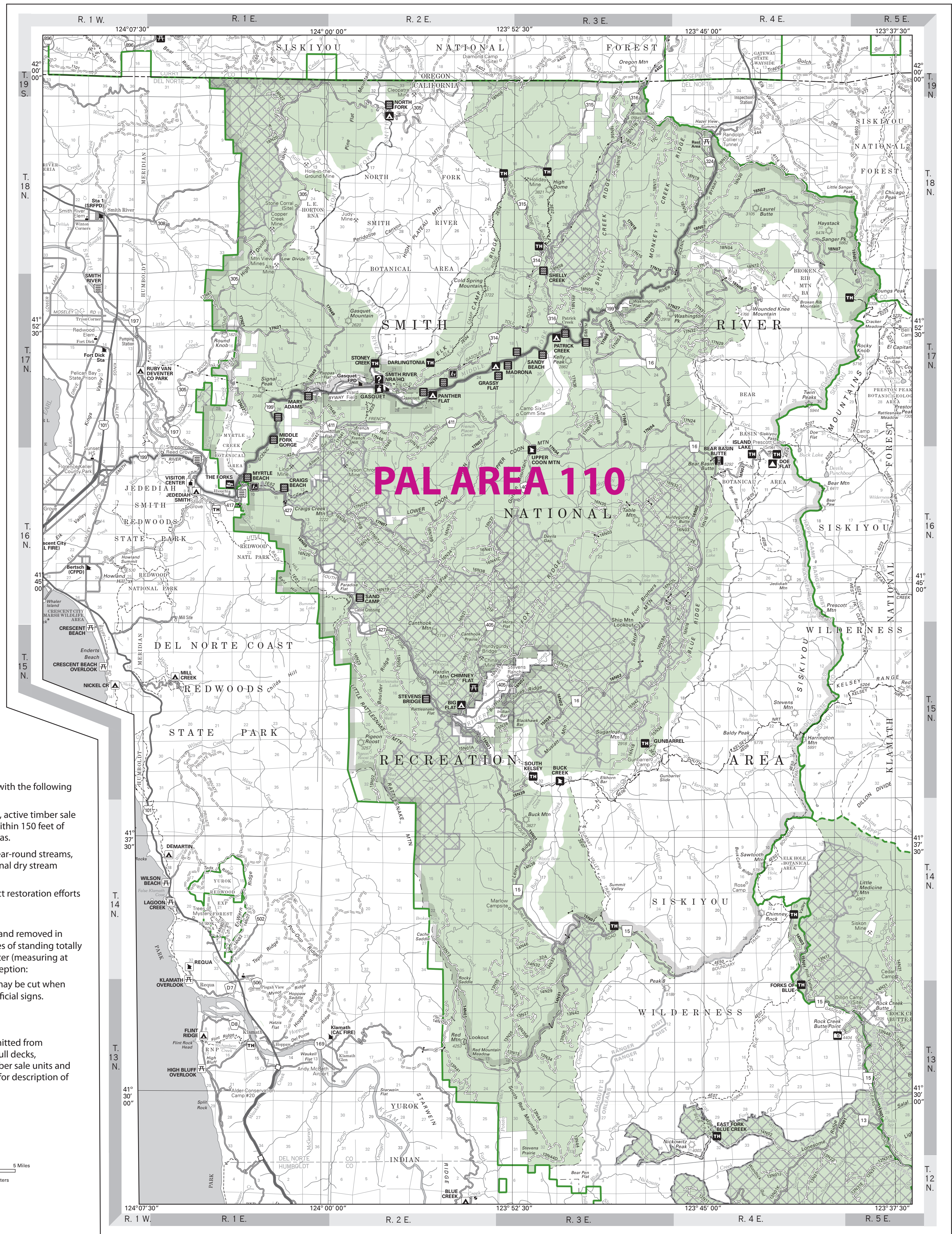
This map and fuelwood tags are a part of your woodcutting permit and must be in your possession while cutting, gathering and transporting your wood.

Motor Vehicle Use

Motor vehicle use on National Forest System Lands is restricted to designated roads and trails. In addition to this map, use a Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM) to make sure you are on a designated route, as they are not always signed on the ground. The MVUM also displays uses allowed by vehicle class (highway-legal vehicles, vehicles less than 50 inches wide and motorcycles), seasonal restrictions and other travel rules and regulations. The MVUM is a free black and white map with no topographic features. Maps are available at each Ranger Station or online at www.fs.usda.gov/srnf.

Where is Cutting allowed?

Open

Cutting is allowed in all areas coded as "Open", with the following exceptions:

- No wood cutting within Administrative sites, active timber sale areas, posted "no wood cutting" areas and within 150 feet of campgrounds and developed recreation areas.
- No wood cutting within 300 feet of rivers, year-round streams, lakes and natural ponds or 150 feet of seasonal dry stream channels and wet areas.
- Other areas closed to woodcutting to protect restoration efforts and tribal resources.

What can be cut in "Open Areas"?

All species of dead and down trees may be cut and removed in portions less than 5 feet in length and all species of standing totally dead trees (snags) of 18 inches or less in diameter (measuring at 4.5' above ground level), with the following exception:

- No dead trees (standing or on the ground) may be cut when marked with paint, wildlife signs, or other official signs.

Restricted

Areas marked "Restricted" cutting is **ONLY** permitted from **September 16 to January 31** within existing cull decks, designated areas within recently harvested timber sale units and within the "road prism". Refer to Attachment A for description of road prism.
