# Travel from Hwy. 224 to Timothy Lake now open!

Forest visitors can now travel from the Hwy. 224 corridor to Lake Harriet and Timothy Lake, following the reopening of more roads on the Clackamas River Ranger District.

- Forest Road (FR) 4631 is now open and is temporarily the suggested route between Hwy. 224 by the Ripplebrook Store and Lake Harriet. **Look for detour signs**.
- FR 4630/Pipeline Rd. is now open. Watch for work trucks.
- FR 57 continues to have hazard log & wood removal and upcoming culvert replacement. Although it's open, expect delays of up to 30 minutes while loading is occurring and a complete, temporary closure when culverts are replaced later this summer.
- RVs & large trailers should continue to take Hwy. 26 to reach Timothy Lake while work on FR 57 continues, as the detour route has a few narrow spots.
- Download a free <u>Mt. Hood Motor Vehicle Use Map</u> ahead of time to show your location on forest roads. The Clackamas River RD has virtually no cell service.
