

PROHIBITIONS

It is prohibited to possess or operate a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands on the Pikes Peak Ranger District other than in accordance with these designations (36 CFR 261.13)

Violators of 36 CFR 261.13 are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000, imprisonment for up to 6 months, or both (18 U.S.C. 3571(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs.

This map does not display nonmotorized uses, over-snow vehicle uses, or other facilities and attractions on the Pikes Peak Ranger District. Obtain forest visitor information from the local national forest office.

Designated roads, trails and areas may also be subject to temporary, emergency closures. As a visitor, you must comply with signs notifying you of such restrictions. A national forest may issue an order to close a road, trail or area on a temporary basis to protect the life, health, or safety of forest visitors or the natural or cultural resources in these areas. Such temporary and/or emergency closures are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212.52 (b), 36 CFR 261 subpart B). The designation "road or trail open to all motor vehicles" does not supersede State traffic

EXPLANATION OF LEGEND ITEMS

Roads Open to Highway Legal Vehicles Only: These roads are open only to motor vehicles licensed under State law for general operation on all public

roads within the state. Roads Open to All Vehicles:

These roads are open to all motor vehicles, including smaller off-highway vehicles that may not be licensed for highway use (but not to oversize or overweight vehicles under State traffic law). Trails Open to Vehicles 50 inches or Less in Width:

These trails are open only to motor vehicles less than 50 inches in width at the widest point on the vehicle.

Trails Open to Motorcycles Only: These trails are open only to motorcycles. Sidecars are not permitted.

Special Vehicle Designation:

This symbol indicates the road or trail is open to classes of vehicles other than those listed above. Refer to the Blanket Statements for Travel Management for further instructions.

Seasonal Designation:

This symbol, used in conjunction with one of the other road or trail symbols, indicates that the road or trail is open only during certain portions of the year. Refer to

Blanket Statements for Travel Management for further

instructions. Other Public Roads and Trails:

Interstate Highways, U.S., State, County & Other Public Roads ---- Other Public Trails

These symbols are used to show routes the Forest Service does not have jurisdiction over and has not designated for motorized use. These symbols are part of the reference layers showing connections to towns and cities outside the forest boundary.

Short Route Identifier:

This symbol is used for roads that are too short to show a symbol type on the map. The symbol contains the number of the road or trail. Users should refer to the corresponding number in the Short RouteTable for designation information.

Motorized Trail Access:

This symbol indicates a trailhead for access to a motorized route. Not all motorized routes have trailheads and those that do may range from primitive to developed.

SEASONAL AND SPECIAL VEHICLE DESIGNATIONS

BLANKET STATEMENTS FOR TRAVEL MANAGEMENT

National Forest System Road 300 (from MP 35.80 to MP 36.49) is marked with a seasonal and special vehicle designation and is open to vehicles 50" or less in width from 12/1 through 4/1. From 4/2 through 11/30, this road is open to highway legal vehicles only.

National Forest System Road 348 (from MP 4.48 to MP 6.86) is marked with a seasonal designation and is open to vehicles 50" or less in width from 12/1 through 4/1. From 4/2 through 11/30, this road is open to all vehicles.

National Forest System Road 333 is marked with a seasonal designation and is open to highway legal vehicles only from 5/1 through 9/30.

National Forest System Road 349 (from MP 0.00 to MP 0.97) is marked with a special vehicle designation and is open only to vehicles 50" or less in width.

National Forest System Road 370 (from MP 5.66 to MP 14.20) is marked with a special vehicle designation and is open only to vehicles 50" or less in width.


The designations shown on this map will remain in effect until revised with the publication of a new map. In January of each year, this motor vehicle use map will either be revised with the publication of a new map, or it will be validated for the new year by the Ranger District with a red

PARKING/DISPERSED CAMPING

stamp that shows: "Valid for Year 20_".

- ON THE PIKE NATIONAL FOREST: Where designated parking areas are not available, and where not specifically prohibited, unsafe, or causing resource damage, parking on National Forest System lands within one
- vehicle length off of designated routes is authorized. • Dispersed camping is authorized on National Forest System lands except in specially designated areas that are closed to dispersed camping.
- Motorized dispersed camping is authorized within one vehicle length off of designated National Forest System routes, where not specifically prohibited, unsafe, or causing
- resource damage. Check with the local National Forest District office for

current information on areas closed to camping and for other travel management information.
