Led by professionals, the Sweet Home Nature and Heritage Tours offer incredible opportunities to learn about the plants, animals, geology and cultural history of the Sweet Home area, located on the edges of the Willamette Valley and within the spectacular Cascade Mountains. Sweet Home Nature and Heritage Tours will take you to the out-of-the-way spots with a friendly group to explore, learn and have a wonderful time while coming to appreciate why the Sweet Home area is such a special place. Whether you're a budding naturalist or a long-time explorer of Pacific Northwest, Sweet Home Nature and Heritage Tours will be an experience you will long remember.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Preregistration is required for all tours and they fill up quickly. Unless otherwise noted in the event description, register at www.recreation.gov or call 1-877-444-6777. Search or ask for Sweet Home Nature and Heritage Tours. Registration begins early May.

Most tour fees are \$10.00 per person and \$5.00 with a Senior or Access Pass. Please be aware there is a \$1.00 service charge per tour, in addition to the fee charged for the hike. Request for refunds must be made at least 2 weeks prior to the date of the tour.

Most hikes/tours meet at the Sweet Home Ranger District Office. Transportation to and from where the hike/tour begins will be provided by USDA Forest Service. A restroom is available at the office, as well as maps and other small souvenirs. Sweet Home is a full service community with restaurants, cafes and gas stations. Transportation to and from the trailhead will be provided by the Forest Service. Most tours are 6 hours and return by 3:00 p.m. Longer 6 to 7 mile tours return by 5:30 p.m.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO:

Hikes leave promptly from the ranger station at the designated start time. Come prepared with enough water, food and supplies necessary to be out all day. Please consider bringing the following items for an enjoyable experience:

- water bottle with extra water
- lunch and nutrient dense snacks
- hiking boots, day pack, hiking stick
- extra socks
- hat
- waterproof jacket
- sunglasses
- sunscreen

- insect repellent
- small first aid kit
- any required medications
- bee or hornet sting kit (if allergic)
- hand wipes
- camera
- binoculars

DIFFICULTY OF EACH HIKE IS BASED ON THE TRAIL RATINGS DESCRIBED BELOW:

Easy: Trail is fairly level, may have short up and down hill sections. Trail surface may be gravel or dirt. **Moderate:** Trail can be steep with long up and down hill sections. Trail surface may be uneven gravel or dirt. **Difficult:** Trail can be steep and have lots of elevation gain or loss with numerous long hilly sections. Trail surfaces can be uneven and rocky.

July 19 Friday Paddle Board or Kayak Daly Lake with the District Ranger Start Time: 10:00am | Location: Meet at the Daly Lake Parking Area Difficulty: Depends on Experience | Paddle boards, kayaks, equipment NOT

provided Enjoy a day of paddling Daly Lake and

conducting a biological inventory of the lake. Activities will include aquatic insect monitoring, amphibian monitoring, fishing, and riparian inventory. Life jackets are required to be worn at all times. Bring all of the things listed for the general hikes as well as a Northwest Forest Pass (day or annual) for your vehicle, your kayak/paddleboard, paddle, wading shoes, fishing license and fishing gear (if you wish to fish). Kayaks over 10 feet in length are required to have an Aquatic Invasive Species permit. There is a 1/4 mile hike in to the lake on a well maintained allaccess trail, so be prepared to portage a short distance. Limit of 20 participants.

Directions to Daly Lake

From Sweet Home, travel east on Highway 20 for 45 miles to Highway 22. Turn left and follow the highway for 7.5 miles to Forest Road 2266 (Parish Lake Road) and turn left. Continue on Forest Road 2266 for 4.8 miles to spur road 450. Turn right and travel 0.5 mile to the trailhead.

July 26 Friday

Mountain Biking with the Ranger - from Tombstone to Pie Start Time: 9:30am | Location: Meet at Tombstone Pass parking lot Difficulty: Moderate

Enjoy a 13 mile single-track mountain bike ride on the historic Santiam Wagon Road going back in time to learn about the importance of this historic route to early settlers. The ride is rated as moderately difficult and has rolling hills with 1,600 feet of elevation gain and 2,700 feet elevation loss. We will ride from Tombstone Prairie Parking area to Clear Lake Resort and celebrate the end of our adventure with pie! We will shuttle participants and their bikes back to their vehicles at Tombstone Pass. Bring all of the things listed for general hikes as well as a Northwest Forest Pass (day or annual) for your vehicle, your mountain bike, a pump, patch kit, any other minor bike repair gear you may need, and a bit of cash to buy your slice of pie.... or refreshment of your choice at Clear

The ride is rated as easy. There are no bridge or stream crossings and the terrain is relatively flat single track trails. There is some rock, so shoes or boots for your horse are recommended. Bring all of the things listed for general hikes as well as a Northwest Forest Pass (day or annual) for your vehicle, your horse, a first aid kit for your horse, weed free hay and water for your horse and a helmet. The ride will start and end at the Fish Lake dispersed camping area (just south of and on the same side of the road as the Fish Lake Day Use Area). Ride meeting at 10am. Foot in the stirrup at 10:30am.

Horseback Ride with The Ranger- From Fish Lake to Seven Mile Horse Camp with an Optional Overnight

Start Time: 9:00am; foot in the stirrup at 9:30am | Location: Meet at Fish Lake dispersed camping area .(just south of and on the same side of the road as the Fish Lake Day Use Area).

Difficulty: Difficult ~ Horses Not Provided

Enjoy a 15 mile horseback bike ride on the historic Santiam Wagon Road going back in time to learn about the importance of this historic route to early settlers from Fish Lake to Seven Mile Horse Camp. We will gain and then lose 3,000 ft. in elevation. There are steep switch-backs with steep pitches on both the uphill and downhill side, several bridge crossings and a few water crossings. There is some rock, so shoes or boots for your horse are recommended. The shuttle vehicles will meet us at Seven Mile Horse Camp and take participants back to their horse trailers at Fish Lake. Bring all of the things listed for general hikes as well as a Northwest Forest Pass (day or annual) for your vehicle, your horse, a first aid kit for your horse, weed free hay in a hay net and a bucket for water and a helmet. The hay nets and water buckets will be transported down to Seven Mile Horse Camp corrals and will be waiting for your horses when they arrive so that they will have food and water while they are waiting for you to return with your horse trailer. An experienced horse person will remain on site at the corrals during the shuttle to ensure the safety of the horses and to safeguard your tack. Limit of 8 participants. There is an option to stay overnight at the horse camp if you wish to continue exploring the Santiam Wagon Road with the Ranger on Saturday morning before you head home.
