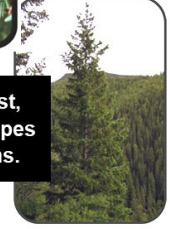


Do not cut Douglas Fir



Short, flat, green needles with red, pointed tips. Cones collect around tree and have papery "tails" sticking out between scales.

Grows on moist, north-facing slopes at all elevations.



Do not cut Ponderosa Pine



Long, round needles grow in clusters. Large woody cones have thick scales.

Scaled bark turns orange as tree matures.



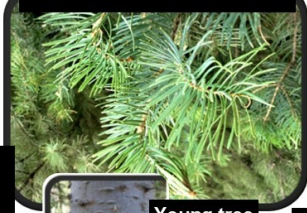
Grows at low to mid elevations.

White Fir, a great Christmas tree

Soft, flat needles with blunt, gray tips.



Abundant at mid elevations



Young tree bark



Grows in clusters. Thinning helps forest health.

Subalpine Fir

Grows at high elevations. Short compact needles.



Engelmann Spruce



Grows at mid elevations.

Bark has gray scales and brownish orange areas.



Sharp, square needles. Cones hang down.
