Be safe. Don't ride alone.

Violations of 36 CFR 261.14 are subject to a fine of up to \$5,000 or imprisonment of up to 6 months or both (U.S.C. 3571(e)). This prohibition applies regardless of the

Routes and areas may also be subject to temporary, Be respectful of other forest users and private property
emergency closures and visitors must comply with signs notifying them of such restrictions. A National Forest may issue an order to close a route or area on a temporary basis to protect the life, health, or safety of forest visitors or the natural or cultural resources in these areas. Such temporary, emergency closures are consistent with the Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212.52(b); 36 CFR

261, subpart B).

OPERATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Operating a motor vehicle on National Forest System lands carries a great responsibility. Not only must you know and follow all applicable traffic laws, you need to show concern for the environment as well as other forest users. As a motor vehicle operator, you are also subject to state traffic law, including state requirements for licensing, registration, and operation of the vehicle in question.

Over-snow vehicle use involves inherent risks that may result in property damage, serious injury, and possibly death to participants. Drive cautiously and anticipate rough surfaces and features, such as snow, mud, vegetation, and water crossings common to remote travel conditions. By your participation, you voluntarily assume full responsibility for damages incurred, and risks and dangers experienced. Take care at all times to protect yourself and those under your responsibility. Much of the White River National Forest is remote. Medical assistance may not be readily available. Cellular telephones do not work in many areas of the White River National Forest. Take adequate food, water, first-aid supplies, and other supplies and equipment appropriate for seasonal


