Preparing to Visit a National Forest

Tornadoes

A tornado is a violently rotating column of air extending from the base of a thunderstorm down to the ground. Tornado intensities are classified as F0 (weakest) to F5 (strongest). They are capable of completely destroying well-made structures, uprooting trees and hurling objects through the air.

A tornado watch is broadcast when conditions are conductive to the development of tornadoes. A tornado warning is issued when a tornado has been sighted, indicated on radar, or is occurring in the warning area.



Safety Checklist

- ☐ The biggest danger you'll face if a tornado strikes while you're in the forest is falling trees and tree limbs.
- □ Visit <u>www.noaa.gov</u> for weather updates.

If outdoors:

- ☐ If possible, get inside a building.
- ☐ At a developed campground, the restroom may be the closest option.
- □ Rock shelters (areas under a cliff line) may offer partial protection from falling tree limbs.
- ☐ If shelter is not available or there is no time to get indoors, lie in a ditch or low-lying area or crouch near a strong building.

If in a car:

- □ Never try to outdrive a tornado in a car or truck. Tornadoes can change direction quickly and can lift up a car or truck and toss it through the air.
- ☐ Get out of the car immediately and take shelter in a nearby building.
- ☐ Seek shelter under an overpass.
- ☐ If there is no time to reach shelter, get out of the car and lie in a ditch or low-lying area away from the vehicle.

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
