## **High Winds**

A microburst is a localized column of sinking air that produces damaging winds near the ground. The high winds of a microburst can knock over fully grown trees. The wind burst will typically last a few seconds.

There are two types of microbursts: wet microbursts and dry microbursts. Pay attention to high wind advisories and high wind warnings issued by the National Weather Service.



## Safety Checklist

- □ If there are high winds in the area you are visiting, take shelter immediately.
- □ Watch out for falling trees and limbs, and flying debris.
- □ Be careful when driving. Strong winds can making driving difficult, especially high profile vehicles (RVs, campers and trucks).
- □ Be careful on bridges and overpasses.
- □ Tune in to local weather forecasts and bulletins issued by the National Weather Service.
