ORGANIZATION OF THE FOREST SERVICE.

The entire organization of the Forest Service is under the general direction and supervision of the Forester, with headquarters at Washington, D. C.

To facilitate administration, the National Forests have been grouped into six districts. A district forester is in charge of each district, and has direct supervision of the local forces and National Forest matters coming within his jurisdiction. The areas embraced in each district are as follows:

District 1.—Montana, northeastern Washington, northern Idaho, northwestern South Dakota, and southwestern North Dakota. Headquarters at Missoula, Mont.

District 2.—Colorado, Wyoming, South Dakota, Nebraska, western Kansas, northern Michigan, and northern Minnesota. Headquarters at Denver, Colo.

District 3.—Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Porto Rico. Headquarters at Albuquerque, N. Mex.

District 4.—Utah, southern Idaho, western Wyoming, eastern and central Nevada, and northwestern Arizona. Headquarters at Ogden, Utah.

District 5.—California and southwestern Nevada. Headquarters at San Francisco, Cal.

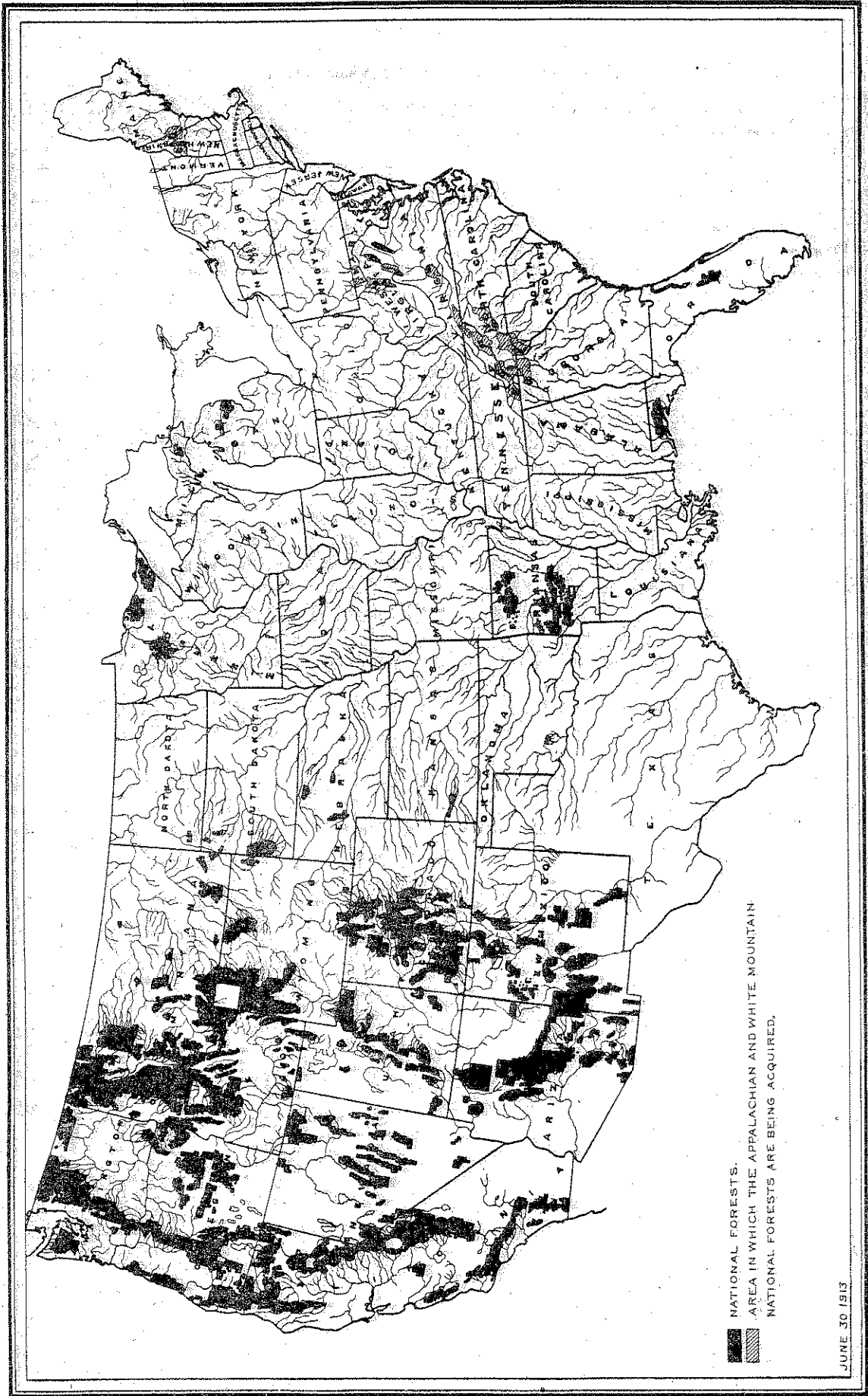
District 6.—Washington, Oregon, and Alaska. Headquarters at Portland, Oreg.

The Forest Products Laboratory is located at Madison, Wis.

The acquisition, under the Weeks law, of lands in the eastern part of the United States is supervised in the Washington office.

On page 8 is a map showing the location of the National Forests and the areas in which the proposed Appalachian and White Mountain National Forests are being acquired by the United States under the Weeks law.

The map also shows the relation of the National Forests to the drainage of the United States.
