Albuquerque Trailhead	Yes	Toilets and corrals.
Bosque Trailhead	No	Toilets, tables, fire grates, trail and corral.
Ox Canyon Trailhead	No	Toilets, fire grates, trails and tables.
Pine Shadows Trailhead	No	Toilets, tables, fire grates, trail, corrals, and stock tank.
Capilla Peak Campground	Yes	Toilets, tables, fire grate or pit, and trails nearby.
Fourth of July Campground	Yes	Toilets, tables, fire grates, and hiking (no livestock permitted)
New Canyon Campground	No	Toilets, tables, fire grates, and trail.
Red Canyon Campground	Yes	Toilets, fire grates and grills, trails, tables, picnic area and horses permitted in upper loop corrals.
Tajique Campground	No	Toilets, tables, fire grates, and fishing in the spring and fall.

Always practice trail courtesy as many trails are multiple use. Visitors should always carry their own water. Every year the mountains of New Mexico exact a toll of victims from the unwary, unprepared and unfit. The chief hazards to be aware of are storms (always dress in layers), dehydration, heat exhaustion, heat stroke and getting lost. A complete itinerary of your trip, along with the name and address of each member, description and license numbers of vehicles used, and expected time of return should always be left with a reliable person. Once underway, stick to your planned route and schedule.

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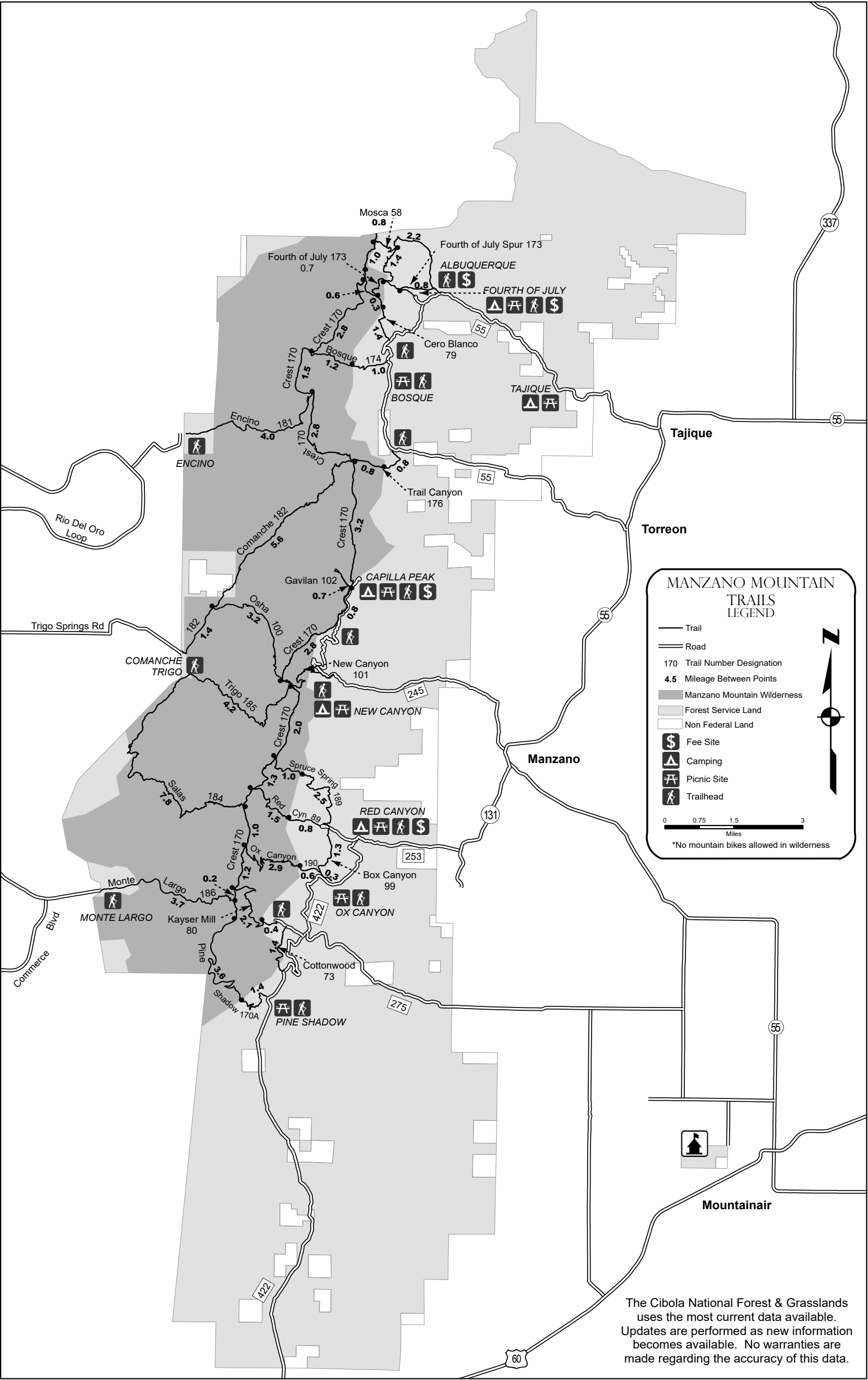
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# Manzano Mountain Trails

**Danger Tree Alert**

Be aware of dead standing trees or “snags” while on your hike, and watch for falling trees. Falling trees can cause serious injury or death. This danger increases in windy conditions. The drought weakened trees here are very susceptible to insects and disease, and thousands of trees have died in recent years. Danger trees are routinely removed from developed sites (such as picnic areas and trailheads) but may still be present in other areas of the Forest.
