STEP 1: Complete at least four activities.


STEP 2: Read and sign the Arizona Junior Ranger Pledge on the back page.



C. Apache-Sitgeaves National Forests




E. Tonto National Forest




Helpful Plants





Mexican Spotted Owl


With large wings and special feathers, owls glide silently through the forest while hunting for food.



How long does it take you to flap 20 times?


Gila Trout
