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PREAMBLE


- Formation of the 1890 Agroforestry Consortium following the First World Agroforestry Congress (FWAC) held at Orlando, Florida, in 2004
- The ontogeny of this 1890 Consortium was the outcome of a series of annual workshops sponsored by the National Agroforestry Center between 2000 and 2004. Workshops were held at Alabama A&M University, where Dr. Greg Ruark, then the Director of NAC was housed.
- These workshops targeted the 1890s and the former Center for Sub-Tropical Agroforestry (CSTAF) at the University of Florida. In the beginning, nearly ten 1890 Universities and Colleges participated in these workshops.

PREAMBLE CONT'D

- However, in the final two years of the Workshop series only six 1890s participated consistently. Six 1890 participants at the Workshop series were present at the FWAC. With the urging of Dr. Ruark and other NAC staff present at the FWAC, a formal meeting was held resulting in what is now known as the 1890 Agroforestry Consortium. The major goal of the AC is to be bring Agroforestry practices to limited resource farmers and land owners to enhance sustainable Agricultural and Forestry systems as well as diversified income and revenue.
- Today the Consortium is made up of faculty from six 1890s and the Federation of Southern Cooperatives. The six 1890s have collaborated on grant granting, organized workshops and symposia, for limited resource and other forestry extension agents. With grants from USDA Forest Service and SARE the 1890 AC has now published two refereed Manuals on Agroforestry.


PICTURE OF PLANTED PINE AREAS 18-20 year old pine plantation

- Two training refereed manuals have been published by the Consortium.
- There is need for more integration across states. For example using the CRP programs across Southern States for a combine small and large ruminants silvopasture will help to accomplish both a sustainable forest management principles and diversify the economy of rural communities.
- The NAC can assist in the sourcing of funding from public and private sectors for this purpose.

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
