

CFLRP RESULTS ON THE LAND AND IN COMMUNITIES

- Created a total of \$1.8 billion in local labor income and supported an average of 5,600 jobs yearly.
- Reduced the risk of catastrophic wildfire on more than 3.4 million acres
- Sold more than 2.9 billion board feet of timber
- Improved over 900 miles of trails
- Enhanced over 3.1 million acres of wildlife habitat
- \$425 million in partnership leveraged across CFLRP landscapes

At 11% of National Forest System treatable acreage, CFLRP's provided 18% of the Agency's total hazardous fuels reductions, 17% of timber volume sold, 18% of soil and water resources enhanced, and 27% of vegetation improved

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COLLABORATIVE FOREST LANDSCAPE RESTORATION ACT


The purpose of CFLRP is to:

- Encourage **collaborative, science-based** restoration
- Support **ecological, economic, and social** sustainability
- **Leverage** local, national, and private resources
- Facilitate the reduction of wildfire management costs and risks, including through **reestablishing natural fire regimes**
- Demonstrate the degree to which various restoration approaches achieve **ecological and watershed health** objectives
- Use forest restoration byproducts to offset treatment costs while benefiting **local rural economies** and improving forest health



CFLRP PROJECTS AT A GLANCE

23 Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Sites




COLLABORATIVE FOREST LANDSCAPE RESTORATION ACT

Funding and Investments:

- Act authorizes funding for implementation and monitoring
- Each project can receive no more than \$4 million of this authorized funding per year
- Funds can be used to cover up to 50% of the implementation and monitoring costs
- Remainder of costs through matching funds



OVERVIEW OF CFLR MATCH



2018 FARM BILL

Reauthorized CFLRP until FY23.

Reauthorization increases *authorization* for appropriation to \$80M.

- This doesn't mean the Program will be funded at that level and at this time we do not know how much funding will be appropriated in FY20.

Besides timeline considerations and the funding cap, there were no other changes to *statutory* program requirements (e.g., how CFLN can be spent, project eligibility, etc.)

CFLRP Advisory Panel

The 2018 Farm Bill, which became law on December 20, 2018, includes a reauthorization of the Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program (CFLRP) through fiscal year 2023. [See the Farm Bill language about CFLRP \(amendments to the original 2009 CFLRP legislation on pg. 376\)](#). Depending on appropriations, the 13 CFLRP projects selected in 2012 will be prioritized for funding their final two years of planned implementation.

Joint Chiefs' Landscape Restoration Partnership

Proposals Due: November 1, 2019

Objective of Joint Chiefs' Landscape Restoration Partnership

Intended to: (1) reduce and mitigate wildfire threats to communities and landowners, (2) protect water quality and supply for communities and industry, and (3) improve habitat quality for at-risk or ecosystem surrogate species.

Budget

- Funds may be used on state, private, USFS, or tribal lands associated with the project proposal.
- Funds for one proposal may be extended for up to 3 years; allocations are made on an annual basis and there is no guarantee of funding in subsequent years.
- Projects will be identified in Regional allocations as priority projects. Funding for these project BLIs will be in addition to the Regional base allocation and identified for expenditure on JCs' projects only.

Proposal Requirements

- Requires two levels of signatures: local NRCS Conservationist and Forest Supervisor as well as NRCS State Conservationist, State Forester, and FS Regional Forester.
- Proposals must include, at minimum, a combination of activities on private and public lands (may be NFS or State land).





Evaluation Criteria

- Alignment with USDA priorities
- Completeness of required NEPA documents for work on public lands
- Support for State and regional priorities
- Clarity of goals, deliverables, and desired outcomes
- Partner support and involvement (non-federal contribution to the project will strengthen application)

Proposal Submissions

- Submissions due by **November 1, 2019** (use required proposal template)
- Submitted electronically to Martin Lowenfish (NRCS) at Martin.Lowenfish@usda.gov and Clint Cross (USFS) at Clint.Cross@usda.gov
- Selected proposals will be announced ~December 2019




REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS STEPS

1. USDA Forest Service Washington Office sends RFP and guidance to Regional Foresters (July 15)
2. Tier 1 (Pre-Proposal) development
3. Tier 1 submitted to Regional Offices



TIER 1 SUBMITTALS



REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS STEPS (CONT...)

4. Regions Offices provide decisions and rationale on which proposals advance to Tier 2.
5. Tier 2 (Full Proposal) development
6. Tier 2 submitted to Regional Offices (see Regional deadlines)
7. Tier 2 nominations submitted to the CFLRP FACA Advisory Committee through the Washington Office (now Jan 24)

*Earliest expected time CFLRP FACA Committee can convene –
March 2020*

*Earliest expected time Secretary will issue decisions -
April/May 2020*

ELIGIBILITY AND SELECTION CRITERIA

Eligibility Criteria

- Requirements from CFLR statute
- “Pass/fail” evaluation by Regions of T2 proposals

Selection Criteria

- Selection criteria from CFLR statute
- Required considerations for Secretary and FACA
- Used to rank projects for selection

- Forest Service selection factors
 - Define success for selection criteria
 - Incorporate program experience to date

EXAMPLE ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Landscapes must be at least 50,000 acres and mostly National Forest System lands

Proposals developed through a collaborative process involving multiple stakeholders

Demonstrate need for restoration and have a substantially complete strategy

Include investment and funding plans

Accessible by wood-processing infrastructure at appropriate scale

Incorporate best available science and scientific application tools

Fully maintain or restore structure and composition of old growth in context of landscape resiliency

Does not establish permanent roads

Provides benefit to local economies

EXAMPLE SELECTION CRITERIA AND FS FACTORS

(A) The strength of the proposal and strategy

Resources, service, values at risk and need for action

Describe significant resources, values, and services at risk that warrant investment.

Strategic treatment at needed scales

Demonstrate how treatments will be strategically implemented within the landscape.

Readiness to implement strategy:

Demonstrate project planning is complete and/or a plan is in place to reach completion in time for treatment.

Unit Capacity:

Demonstrate capacity to successfully implement the project, including leadership and strong partner support.

Instructions for Applicants – Proposal (Tier 2) Submissions

The Tier 2 proposal forms the basis for the CFLRP Federal Advisory Panel (FACA) to review, evaluate, and make recommendations to the Secretary of Agriculture for funding. Not only is it central to proposal review and selection, it also serves as the CFLRP implementation strategy if selected for funding. Selected projects will be required to develop a work plan based on their proposals. While recognizing the need to adapt to unforeseen circumstances and take advantage of unexpected opportunities, this **proposal is viewed as a commitment to the strategy outlined within it.**

General Tips:

- Do not use a question and answer format in the proposal. Questions listed below are only inter- help guide the proposal’s narrative for that section.

How Will This Proposal be Evaluated?

- All CFLRP proposals must m- **CFLRP Eligibility Criteria from the statute** to be forwarded to the FACA advisory panel for- and recommendation to the Secretary of Agriculture, who will make final selections. - *Successful proposals will meet the Eligibility Criteria and address Forest Service Selection Factors in their responses. **Applicants should refer to both when completing their Tier 2 proposals***

Tier 2 Proposal Formatting:

Proposals need to be relatively uniform to allow efficient and timely evaluation and recommendation by the FACA advisory panel. The guidelines were developed to ensure a standard organization.

CFLRP Tier 2 Proposal Template for New Projects

Successful proposals will address all [CFLRP eligibility criteria \(from CFLRP statute\)](#) and reflect the [Forest Service selection factors](#). For that reason, review these criteria before completing the template below. Please reference the examples in the [Instructions for Tier 2 Instructions to Applicants](#) document (coming soon to [the CFLRP website](#)) as a model for your answers and stick to the page limits listed in the document below.






First and foremost, however, applicants should read the CFLRP [Eligibility Criteria and Forest Service Selection Factors](#) and ensure their proposals meet the eligibility criteria and will be competitive according to the selection factors. In addition we encourage you to work with the Regional CFLRP contact in your Region ([contacts](#) listed here) to work through any questions that arise.


